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INTRODUCTION

Since the presentation of the first annual Gender Action Plan progress report to the Executive Board in 2015, UNICEF has prepared an accompanying data companion. The data companion provides detailed information on the organizational performance of UNICEF on gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls, and the data are disaggregated by UNICEF region.

The data companion provides a progress update on the Gender Action Plan results matrix, which is aligned and structured in accordance with the results framework of the UNICEF Strategic Plan, 2022–2025, and consists of five Goal Areas as well as key performance indicators on organizational effectiveness and efficiency. Each of the five Goal Areas has three levels of indicators: impact, outcome and output.

Impact

These indicators track changes in the lives of children and reflect UNICEF shared commitment to children.

Outcome

These indicators represent institutional and behavioural changes to which UNICEF contributes, in collaboration with partners.

Output

These indicators are most closely associated with the work and contributions of UNICEF. Baselines, results, milestones and targets are expressed as annual figures for most indicators. Where cumulative figures are shown, this is indicated.

While the data companion reports on the current status of gender-relevant Strategic Plan impact and outcome indicators, its main focus is on the output indicators. The indicators in the data companion are categorized across the dual gender-programming approach applied within UNICEF, namely the gender priorities across the life course and the adolescent girls' empowerment priorities. Indicators monitoring life-course results are categorized by the five Goal Areas. The adolescent girls' empowerment priorities include girls' nutrition, pregnancy care, HIV and human papillomavirus prevention; girls' secondary education and skills; child marriage and early unions; and dignified menstrual health and hygiene. The data companion presents graphs illustrating performance against only a small subset of indicators, which are arranged by gender priority arranged by the Goal Areas.

In addition to programme indicators, the data companion provides an update on the progress made in relation to the UNICEF targets for organizational effectiveness and efficiency indicators related to gender equality. These indicators have been identified to track improvements in institutional effectiveness in order to achieve results on gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls. Furthermore, these benchmarks are aligned with the key areas of investment for UNICEF, namely, systems strengthening, capacity enhancement and resource investment, in its implementation of the Gender Action Plan.


Health workers receiving support through UNICEF programmes
































The Gender Action Plan implementation standard

The Gender Action Plan implementation standard (or GAP standard) measures whether a country office meets organizational standards for the implementation of the Plan at the country level.

With the new version of the GAP standard, designed for the Strategic Plan 2022–2025, UNICEF has attempted to identify and monitor key aspects, systems and processes that favour programming, achieving and effectively reporting gender results. Building on the institutional standard for the Gender Action Plan 2018-2021, the new GAP standard tracks nine criteria. They range from institutional readiness to accountability, and finally to programming and quality of gender results achieved on the ground and reported. These ambitious measures are helping to advance efforts to tackle systemic barriers and bottlenecks, and contribute to transformational change in the medium to long term.

The unit of analysis is the country office, which allows for regional and global aggregations. Each country receives a score on each criteria as well as a final overall score. The sources for the criteria are mostly internal, corresponding to dedicated Strategic Plan indicators, or are based on extractions from proprietary databases (the enterprise resource planning software VISION, the Results Assessment Module (RAM) databases, the capacity-building and training database AGORA, the emergency and preparedness platform (EPP)). All of these sources have established quality control mechanisms in place. In some instances, external data (i.e., Economic Dividends for Gender Equality, or EDGE certification) is used.

Global, regional and country performance are displayed through dedicated and succinct visuals accessible to all UNICEF staff members on tailored gender dashboards that are available on the intranet, helping offices monitor and improve their performance on the GAP standard.










Protection from sexual exploitation and abuse




Percentage of offices meeting organizational standards for UNICEF Gender Action Plan implementation

Percentage of female staff, by level




Percentage of female International Professional staff, by region







Country offices that have management structures for the implementation of gender programming





6. Expenditures

UNICEF uses a gender equality marker (GEM) and gender tags at the activity level for a nuanced tracking of the allocation and expenditure of resources related to results that promote gender equality. This allows for reporting on expenses on *gender-transformative programming* and on *gender-integrated programming*, across development and humanitarian contexts.

An important point to note is the evolution of the formulas for calculating gender expenditures. As was the case at the onset of the previous Gender Action Plan, calculation formulas were revised to reflect more ambitious goals in terms of gender results.


The new gender transformative expenditures formula only reflects results where gender equality is the principal objective, as compared to the previous Gender Action Plan where it was a principal or significant objective. This results in a noticeable drop in expenditures from 2018 to 2022⁹ (see graph below) signifying UNICEF commitment to transformative change in the longer run. The new gender-integrated expenditures formula is also tighter.

- b) In humanitarian contexts





Gender integrated expenditures correspond to programmes with a gender dimension but for which gender is not the principal objective.





Percentage of country offices that conducted a Gender Programmatic Review in the current programme cycle (2022)



Integration of Gender Programmatic Review recommendations into programming documents




Percentage of country offices that have incorporated Gender Programmatic Review recommendations into all relevant programme planning documents (2022)


Percentage of country offices that conducted a rapid gender analysis in a humanitarian context (2022)




Distribution by type of rapid gender analysis

Number of country offices that have integrated at least one out of six gender activities in their emergency preparedness plans



Gender-based violence risk-mitigation




Percentage of country offices that have implemented a minimum set of gender-based violence risk-mitigation actions



Percentage of country offices with a humanitarian situation implementing the Core Commitments for Children in Humanitarian Action (CCCs):






Percentage of country offices using at least one gender standard indicators in the programme management platform (RAM standard indicators)










Global and regional scores on the GAP standard




